# The new handheld ultrasound machine set to 'dramatically' alter how doctors work

It's the bold call that would end more than two centuries of medical practise: throw away the stethoscope. But Royal Melbourne Hospital cardiothoracic surgeon Alistair Royse is willing to make it.

Professor Royse believes new handheld ultrasound technology connected to mobile phones will inevitably make the tool obsolete.

The hospital, along with the University of Mel-bourne, has begun using the Butterfly tool, a small handheld



ultrasound device which provides images instantaneously on a connected smartphone. "Diagnosis and treatment will get quicker," Professor Royse said.

It means that in hospitals, large ultrasound machines do not need to be wheeled around or patients sent to specialist rooms for x-rays. "Ultrasound makes it more accurate, faster, and safer because it doesn't involve radiation," he said.

Professor Royse said it meant doctors and nurses could see issues straight away without having to wait for results to be returned.

"This is dramatically going to change the way medical practise is done, I genuinely think this the opportunity to throw away your stethoscope," Professor Royse told the ABC.

In the future, it could be used by GPs, who could call a specialist and discuss the images live by sharing the vision online.

Professor Royse said he saw the potential for paramedics.

"It's revolutionary because all of a sudden you are using cloud-based sharing and archiving, and therefore you can share in real time, like social media, as opposed to a static system in the hospital, which is connected to the physical archiving," he said.

Unlike traditional machines, the Butterfly device uses a computer chip with tiny little discs on it rather than little shafts of crystal.

#### Bedside ultrasound boosts health results

"About one third of patients have a tangible, meaningful change in their diagnosis based on the addition of ultrasound imaging at the bedside, and roughly half of those will lead to a meaningful change in the treatment," Professor Royse said.

The technology is also much cheaper, with one device costing just \$3,000.

The next-cheapest portable machine in a hospital is \$20,000.



Lung patient Clare Sendapperuma said the real-time sharing of information gave her peace of mind.

" Ms Sendapperuma said it reduced her stress levels

Sometimes crucial decisions are made immediately and to take action," she said.

"[It's] excellent, otherwise we would have to go down to get a scan, people have to push a wheelchair or a bed, but in your own room its easy access, ease of use, that is very good," she said.

#### Potential to help regional patients

The technology has only just arrived in Australia and is being hailed a success overseas. So far, the Royal Melbourne Hospital has just two, and both were personally funded by Victorian Planning Minister Richard Wynne. Just after the 2014 state election, Professor Royse performed life-saving cardiac surgery on Mr Wynne.

"This new technology is quite extraordinary," Mr Wynne said.

He said he hoped it would eventually help people in regional Victoria. "For areas that may not be not so closely linked to major public hospitals like this, to be able to access information in real time life-saving evidence."

# A Message from AV CEO Assoc. Prof. Tony Walker ASM



I hope everyone is well and that you are all enjoying some of the warmer weather after what feels like a long winter!

We have had a number of new initiatives

announced recently that I wanted to share with you, the first of which is Ambulance Victoria's Draft Accessibility Action Plan. This plan forms part of a series of initiatives aimed to reinforce a safe and inclusive culture at AV. It has been informed by extensive internal and external consultation process with many of our people as well as people with lived disability, carers, sector stakeholders and policy makers. The plan outlines how we can better meet the needs of people with disability who interact with our organisation, including our patients, our people and our community. I look forward to sharing the final plan broadly once we have incorporated the feedback received. We have also now implanted our new Social and Environmental Responsibility Framework and Action Plan. This plan sets out a clear sustainability path for us for the future with a focus on reducing our carbon footprint. It was developed through consultation internally and externally and sets us up to do things in a more sustainable way into the future.

Incredibly, this week marked the 20th anniversary of our Victorian Ambulance Cardiac Arrest Registry (VACAR). The Registry captures a wealth of information about Out of Hospital Cardiac Arrest. Over the past two decades it has accumulated information on more than 100,000 cardiac arrests, from pre-hospital care to hospital discharge and 12 month post survival quality of care. As they say, you can't improve what you don't measure. VACAR is considered one of the most comprehensive registries in the world and has been the engine room driving the significant improvements we have seen in cardiac arrest survival over time. Prof Karen Smith and Prof Steve Bernard have been the driving force behind it for the past 20 years and I would like to particularly acknowledge their efforts and hard work and all those that have contributed to it over time.

I also recently attended a dinner to celebrate the 125th anniversary of the Salvation Army building at 69 Bourke Street. Ambulance has a long relationship with the Salvos and have been working closely together over the past few years on various initiatives to improve the health and wellbeing of the homeless and at risk members of our community, particularly around the CBD. I love hearing about the history of our great organisation and I recently learnt that our relationship with the Salvos goes back much further than I originally thought. In 1898 they took charge of the Headquarters Ambulance Brigade, a service to the community supplementing the meagre ambulance service then operating out of Eastern Hill and Flagstaff Fire Stations and by 1915 had 5 motor ambulances and volunteer salvationist drivers servicing the City. So there you go - a partnership going back 121 years and still going strong!!

Finally, November is just around the corner and this year, we are excited to be partnering with the Movember Foundation to

help men live happier, healthier, longer lives - one Mo at a time. The Movember Foundation is a charity dedicated to tackling men's health issues, and throughout November we'll be raising awareness and funds for an issue that I am very passionate about - mental health and suicide prevention. The program allows volunteers to provide confidential support to previous employees who have retired or resigned and assist in linking them into appropriate support if requiring counselling or experiencing mental health issues.

RAFE volunteers are not qualified counsellors and are unable to make psychological assessments, but they do have great listening and communication skills that allow them to assist those who are seeking help.



The Victorian Government is working closely with Ambulance Victoria to modernise, rebuild and upgrade outdated ambulance stations and vehicles across the state to provide better working conditions for paramedics and faster emergency healthcare for patients.

# Scope

Modern, advanced and well-located ambulance stations mean Victorians can receive the right care at the right time, during an emergency. Upgrading and renewing high priority ambulance stations will improve response times and ensure that paramedics are supported to care for communities, now and in the future.

The Government has committed \$126.9 million since 2015 to upgrade and rebuild high priority ambulance stations at 35 locations across the state, including critical maintenance work on other stations in urgent need of repair. This funding amount also includes:

- O investing in hospital emergency departments to increase the availability of beds
- O providing new ambulance vehicles and equipment, including five new complex patient ambulance vehicles and new hydraulic stretchers for existing vehicles.

# Life-saving program proves a success

An evaluation of the Heart Safe Community program shows it has been an outstanding success, including generating a four-fold increase in the confidence of participants to start and perform cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR).

One beneficiary of the program is David Hughes, who was given bystander CPR after he had a cardiac arrest in Tatura on Christmas Day 2018.

"All I can say is I am just so, so grateful because they knew exactly what to do," said David.


The CPR was performed by Andrea Manners, a skill she learned during a Heart Safe Community session.

Tatura was the first town to become a Heart Safe Community under an initiative led by Ambulance Victoria and the Heart Foundation.

In 18 months, 1055 residents – about onequarter of the population – was trained to provide CPR and use a defibrillator.

Over the same period, the number of registered defibrillators in the town increased from three to 26, including seven that are publicly accessible 24 hours a day.

The evaluation by the University of Melbourne showed the benefits of the program, which has since expanded to Inverloch and the Bellarine Peninsula

- 4. Alcohol does not solve any problems but then, neither does milk.


