Australian Defence Force personnel sent to Victoria to help bolster paramedic numbers as coronavirus continues to spread

Army personnel will be sent to Victoria to help paramedics amid fears the spread of coronavirus could stretch Ambulance Victoria too thin.

The state's Premier Daniel Andrews said at a press conference earlier today, he had struck an agreement with Prime Minister Scott Morrison for a 1,000-strong team of ADF members to reinforce Victoria over the next three to four weeks.

It comes as Victoria records over 400 cases of COVID-19, the highest daily increase since the start of the pandemic. (As at 22 July)

Mr Andrews said a key role of the additional ADF members would be to "support the inevitable number of paramedics who will finish up having to quarantine, having to isolate, having to be furloughed because of exposure or potential exposure [to coronavirus]".

"It's also just a great way to best use the resources that we have, freeing up additional ambulance paramedics. That will be rolled out quite soon," he said.

Acting director of emergency management Justin Dunlop told ABC Drive the additional support was welcome and people should be reassured if they saw ADF members in an ambulance.

"It means there are more members of the community helping us," Mr Dunlop said.

"It doesn't mean there's a crisis and it might mean they are doing some training with us."

Mr Dunlop said it would take about 10 days to train an ADF member to assist a paramedic.

ADF members will also help with contact tracing, planning and logistics in the State Control Centre, delivering care packages and essentials to public housing residents, community engagement, assisting Victoria Police at vehicle checkpoints and compliance checks to make sure people who must self-isolate are doing so.

"That frees up Victoria Police members and allows them to be focused on ... defending that hard border between Metropolitan Melbourne, Mitchell Shire and regional Victoria," Mr Andrews said.

Mr Andrews also said the ADF would provide support for coronavirus testing in rural and regional Victoria.

The extra 1,000 members are in addition to about 400 members already on the ground helping Victoria Police plan and enforce stage three restrictions.

The members already in Victoria are expected to remain in the

A Message from AV CEO Assoc. Prof. Tony Walker ASM



Hi everyone,

Since my last note we have continued to ride the wave of uncertainty that defines this COVID-19 pandemic. AV has been providing pre-hospital emergency care and support to the community in response to the COVID-19 pandemic since the 22nd Jan 2020, when the first airport transfer was requested. The impacts on ambulance demand have changed as the community's response has evolved. Stage 3 restrictions were reimposed on 8th July as a response to the significant increase in community transmission of COVID-19 and we all find ourselves back in that challenging reality of staying home to stop the spread.

Social distancing and hand hygiene remain of utmost importance. The announcement from the Premier and Chief Health Officer on the weekend extends the wearing of face masks to everyone in metropolitan Melbourne and Mitchell Shires.

To support this I wanted to share some of the handy resources I found on Social Media over the weekend to help you find the masks we now all need to wear.

- DHHS recommends either surgical masks or 3ply cloth masks and advises Victorians against wearing P2 or N95 masks to preserve stock for healthcare workers
- They also have great advice on how to make your own mask and fit and maintain it correctly
- Surgical masks can be purchased at pharmacies, bulk online retailers and even hardware stores
- Many Australian retailers are making reusable masks – here's a list of ethical retailers you can support- Fella Hamilton, Jem Designs, LMB Knitwear/Otto & Spike, Merino Country, Nya, The Ark, The Social Studio, Undercovers Apparel, A.BCH,

We have a number of demand strategies in place including the use of partner agencies. Last week, the Premier announced that the Australian Defence Force is ready to assist Ambulance Victoria to manage demand if the availability of our workforce was to fall to a level that compromised our service delivery capacity. We have not reached this stage - this is simply about being prepared.

To other matters, I am pleased to share that AV are leading the health sector in Victoria having signed on to purchase renewable energy sourced from wind farming. From July, fourteen of our large sites including Gippsland, Hume, South Melbourne, Doncaster and Ballarat offices will be using 100% renewable energy, reducing our overall emissions footprint with further sustainability work being undertaken as part of our commitment to zero emissions in the longer term.

As we all know, these restrictions can leave many of us feeling socially isolated. I encourage you to stay connected to others by phone and internet. 

Two Englishmen and a Canadian walk into a Branch



Things were a bit different in 1990. The clothes were baggier. People wore multi-coloured woollen jumpers unironically and Bob Hawke was PM. House prices were cheap and international phone calls were expensive. But Ambulance Victoria didn't mind the cost and put out an international call with a difference – asking paramedics around the world to come to Australia and work for what was then known as the Metropolitan Ambulance Service.

Three of the men who answered that call are still working at Ambulance Victoria today, and are celebrating the 30th anniversary of taking a chance to serve a whole new community.



When David Millican arrived with his wife and two children from England, he knew he wanted to stay, but kept quiet because

his wife believed it was only going to be a two-year gig. He needn't have worried. 'When two years came around, she wasn't even interested in going back,' he says.

David is still with AV as a Senior Team Manager. For him, retraining as a Mobile Intensive Care Ambulance paramedic (MICA) and



working at AV was just the same as working back home in England.

So too for Nick Thresher and

his family, saying 'I knew from the first day I wanted to be here and for 12 months my wife wanted to go home, then it changed'. As an instructor with London Ambulance Service during industrial action, the lure of Australia was too strong to ignore.

Even though 'the job was the same', Nick immediately noticed some key differences. AV was 'far more academic and the UK was far more practical,' he says. 'In the UK, paramedics weren't seen as professionals, [but] you were seen as part of the full health care system in Australia. It was very stimulating and new to me.'

For Canadian Brad Sanders, whose wife is Australian, the differences were more dramatic. 'Working in Canada as a paramedic I dealt with pretty standard cases, nothing too intense,' he says, 'but when I came to Australia I was faced with much more intense work and I had to learn fast. It was definitely an upskill for my skillset coming to Australia.'



Despite having to retrain to meet Australian levels of practice, David says, 'The most challenging thing for me was not so much the work styles. It was getting used to the Aussie climate. I wore shorts all winter!' There were also some logistics to get used to. 'Driving lights and sirens on the 'wrong' side of the road was an experience.'

Over thirty years, all three men have thrived and put down roots in their communities. David became a MICA paramedic, and Brad is a MICA and also worked with the Air Ambulance. Nick shares his considerable skills as a driving instructor at AV and hasn't regretted the

move: 'Oz has given my family so much and now I have an Aussie grand-daughter!', he says.

Now that call to serve is going the other way, according to Nick.

"A lot of newly graduated paramedics are heading to London these days," he says, "London Ambulance is always looking for new recruits from AV ... because AV is such a well-respected ambulance service."

3. Although the manufacturing of ambulances is based on an affordable vehicle – the finished product is in fact VERY expensive. Prices for a brand-new ambulance can cost upwards of \$100,000 all the way to \$200,000.

4. QLD and Tasmanian ambulance fees are covered by the government, however residents of other states are not so fortunate. An emergency ambulance trip by road costs around \$1174 in the metropolitan area of Victoria.

It can cost up to \$4898 for an air ambulance and up to \$10,475 for a helicopter, with prices set

by the Department of Health. In comparison, resident of South Australia are charged \$934 for emergency callouts and Western Australians \$932 for life threatening or urgent related incidents.





Improved Chaplaincy Support within Ambulance Victoria (AV)

At the most recent meeting between AV Wellbeing & Support Services, RAAV and RAFE Peer Support, Stuart Stuart AV's Head Chaplain provided an update on Chaplaincy Support Services revamped model being adopted by AV.

Stuart pointed out that AV currently has effectively 1.8 fulltime Chaplains to support the whole of Victoria with both Chaplains being located within the Melbourne Metro area and therefore struggle to cover the whole of the State in a timely and appropriate manner.

The new model which is on the process of being implemented includes;

- The appointment of a mix of both full-time and volunteer Chaplains across AV
- A Chaplain will be appointed to each of the 5 Regional Areas on a part-time basis effective providing 0.5 full time effective employment
- An additional 15 Volunteer Chaplains from the Victorian Council of Churches Emergency Ministry (VCCEM) will also be appointed and located across the 5 Regional areas of AV to support both the part-time Chaplains and AV Staff.

VCCEM provide a range of support services including psychological first aid, emotional and spiritual care during State Disasters and recovery such as Black Saturday Bushfires and more recent the Bourke Street incident. Are routinely called upon by VICPOL to support people involved in serious accident including road trauma

These additional Chaplaincy and Pastoral Care services can serve to enhance the support offered to the RAAV Membership.

From writing yarns, to lights and sirens

In 1990, the local paramedic in Kerang started teaching a young journalist first aid skill because both always saw each other at the same call outs.

While the paramedic was looking for an extra set of hands to help people, it was a revelation for the young man.

That paramedic suggested to Ken Jenkins, a journalist from what is now the *Gannawarra Times*, become an Ambulance Community Officer (ACO).

It was a chance to see and help his community in a whole new light.

Ken celebrates 30 years as an ACO and has no plans to stop in 2020.

"It's a special way of dealing with the community. You come across people in tragic situations, and it's wonderful to help them get through it." As one of the 1,100 ACOs across Victoria, Ken admits he has always loved serving his community, including a 16-year stint as a board member at Kerang District Health, not to mention his four terms as chairman.

It's obviously become a family calling, with two of Jenkins' daughters working in the health industry.

"The paramedics really appreciate the contribution. To be accepted by the AV community means a lot. The treatment we provide today is very collaborative with the paramedic."

Contributing to small communities is in Ken's DNA, and he encourages everyone to take on similar roles.

An ACO's role has changed dramatically over the years, from providing simple first aid and oxygen, to a more connected approach with paramedics. "Our small communities wouldn't exist without these contributions. You can make a big difference if you do it."

Ken has seen unprecedented changes to emergency response as an ACO in the COVID -19 era.

"The biggest change is the protective gear and cleaning of our equipment. I'm also seeing some older people not calling Triple Zero (000), which is concerning. There's also less trauma due to the reduction in sport and recreational activities."

Over the years, Ken has seen many recruits join the ranks as ACOs go on to work as nurses and paramedics. But for Ken, serving the 3,000-plus town he loves is the best work around.
