I am part of an ambulance dynasty with my father (John Sr), my brothers (Pete and John) and my brother-in-law Darrell Douglas all having worked in the Victorian ambulance industry. My Uncle Chas was an ambulance officer in London, as was my father before we emigrated to Australia, and my sister Jackie was a registered nurse.

I started work in1974 at age 17 as a cadet ambulance officer at the then Peninsula Ambulance Service. My introduction to ambulance was with Senior Station Officer Peter Watson walking into the boardroom and giving us the rounds of the kitchen and frightening the heck out of us as young kids. It obviously didn't work as my association with ambulance lasted 42 years.
